The Sukiennice, a huge market hall built in the 13th century in the middle of Rynek Główny (Main Square), enlarged in the 14th century in the Gothic style and remodelled in the mid-16th century after Renaissance fashion, was restored in 1875–1879 and became the city's showpiece facility hosting grand balls and patriotic celebrations. Its location and character made the rooms on the first floor of the Sukiennice a perfect place for the National Museum in Krakow. Initially the Museum shared premises with the Fine Arts Society. Polish Art Gallery of the nineteenth century, is open-museum. The exhibition in the „New Sukiennice” is divided into four sections: Hall of Chelmoński, Hall of Siemiradzki, Hall of Michałowski and Hall of Bacciarelli. The museum includes paintings and sculptures representing the era and the most important trends in Polish art of the nineteenth century.

Benedictine Abbey in Tyniec

The Monastery together with the Church of the Holy Apostles Paul and Peter are perched on a steep limestone hill overlooking the Vistula River, on the south-west outskirts of Krakow. The early romanesque abbey and church were surrounded by a defensive wall in the 13th Century. The church was rebuilt in the Gothic style in the 15th Century and then in Baroque fashion in the 17th and 18th Centuries. Today the abbey provides a home for 40 monks whose lives revolve around prayer, work and confronting the challenges of contemporary life. The Benedictine monks attach enormous weight to relations and contacts with their fellow human beings and thus invite tourists and pilgrims to visit them at Tyniec Abbey.
